Priest-in-Charge Father Cody Maynus

About a third of our parish carpooled to the Twin Cities to support three of our own—Liz Campbell, Soren Murphy-Pearson, and Luke Sargent—who were confirmed in The Episcopal Church on a beautiful late April afternoon. Our three were joined by about 80 others from parishes throughout the diocese and the liturgy was celebrated in Karen, Hmong, Spanish, and English!

There are some authors and speakers who have made their whole brand identity on the premise that the Church is dying. (I won't name names, but I sure could!) I used to think this narrative was compelling and got really anxious about what would happen when it did. I spent all kinds of time wringing my hands and wondering how we could possibly stop church decline or at least slow it way down so that we could at least pass the decline off to another generation.

I used to believe this, but then I got out from behind my desk and actually experienced the Church in all its diversity first hand. I then realized that the Church is way too vibrant to die! More than 400 people of great diversity—people of several races and ethnicities, gender identities and sexual orientations, political backgrounds and ideological frameworks, ages and experiences—came together and sat in a hot cathedral on a beautiful spring day and pledged to support their friends and fellow pilgrims as they recommitted themselves to love God, one another, and, indeed, the whole world. Not the people they like or with whom they agree, but the whole world!

My goodness! If that's what the big wig thinkers call "dying," then I'd hate to see what living looks like!

As of May 2023, our mortgage payment is BELOW \$150,000! This is a big milestone (our initial loan in 2013 was for \$900,000 to cover the remaining cost of the building project), and is due to the continued generosity of the All Saints community. Our monthly loan payment (\$1,786) covers both principal and interest, and is included in our annual budget for operating expenses. So thank you to everyone who gives generously each year in support of the operating expenses of the church! Thank you also to those who donate extra funds during the year that go towards the principal, thus reducing the number of years to pay off the loan!

Vestry Retreat April 15, 2023







Introducing the New All Saints Ministry Teams

At our recent Vestry retreat, we spent some time discussing the current work of the parish and how that work fits into God's mission in the world. After discernment and discussion, the Vestry has decided to adopt an organizing model that distributes leadership throughout the parish and allows the Vestry to spend more of its time on dreaming big dreams and leading our parish into the future.

In some parishes—usually smaller ones than ours—the senior warden is seen as the person "in charge" of the parish, the junior warden is seen as the person responsible for fixing things and taking care of the building, and the vestry is seen as the most active or most prominent members of the parish. The priest, in these congregations, tends to be a chaplain: present only on Sundays and during life cycles (funerals, baptisms, etc) and any time the wardens need the priest. For some congregations, this model is their only option due to size and/or resources. There aren't enough people to whom the work might be spread out and they might not have the funds to support a priest.

All Saints, however, has the good fortune of being in a stable financial situation and having a larger community from which to discern and raise up leaders. This means that we can identify leaders for each area of our parish's ministry and life together and allow the vestry and clergy to appropriately support those leaders in their ministry. This also allows the vestry the opportunity to spend time in prayer and reflection, casting a vision into the future and leading us in the direction of that vision.

In this new model, the work of the parish is split up into nine ministry teams which work independently of one another while also staying part of the bigger picture through their team leads, the wardens, and the priest-incharge. Each ministry team has a leader who is responsible for it's various ministries, events, and groups. This person does not necessarily have to do or organize all of the work within their area, but they are responsible for making sure that it gets done and supporting those within each area who are involved in the implementation if the work. Each ministry team is supported by either the senior or the junior warden, as well as the parish clergy.

Don't feel like you have to be responsible for knowing the ins and the outs of the model right away. The most important thing for you to know is who to talk to about various parts of our life together here at All Saints. In the old days, you might automatically talk to the senior warden if it's about the congregation, the junior warden if it's a maintenance concern, or the priest if it's a spiritual concern. In this model, all that changes is that those responsibilities are shared with a larger group of people, ensuring that more voices are heard and the experiences of more people are allowed to shape our lives together in this parish.


There is nothing magical about this organizational model. We are giving it a try and seeing how it serves us. If we figure out that this doesn't work or that something else would work better, then we will pivot in that direction. The good news is that our All Saints Vestry is composed of remarkably dedicated folks who work very well together.

Mrs. Moxie, and the whole Pride in the Park - Northfield committee is working so hard to make sure that every person in Northfield is seen, heard, welcomed, and loved. Episco-Speak A Guide to the Language of Episcopalians

This month: Whitsunday/Whitsuntide

A feast of the Church which commemorates the Descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles, fifty days after the Resurrection of Christ, on the ancient Jewish festival called the "feast of weeks" or Pentecost (Exodus 34:22; Deuteronomy 16:10). Whitsunday is so called from the white garments which were worn by those who were baptized during the vigil; Pentecost ("Pfingsten" in German), is the Greek for "the fiftieth" (day after Easter). Whitsunday, as a Christian feast, dates back to the first century. Whitsuntide is the season of Pentecost. Both are terms that are little used today.
