Priest-in-Charge Father Cody Maynus



A few months ago, Bishop Loya emailed me and asked me to consider applying for the inaugural cohort of something called the Leader's Way at Yale Divinity School. I skimmed the website and was intrigued, but was fuzzy on the details. When a bishop asks you to do something, it is often easier to say 'yes' and ask questions later. So I filled out the application and, to my surprise, was accepted into the program.

As I mentioned, I was fuzzy on the details of the cohort. To my knowledge, this is not something that Yale has done before (which was confirmed during our orientation session.) While many seminaries are shifting their focus away from residential and accredited degree programs, Berkeley Divinity School—the Episcopal seminary within the larger divinity school—is recognizing the need to provide both traditional and non-traditional ways of forming leaders for the Church and for the world.

This inaugural cohort brought together about 50 priests and deacons from a diversity of dioceses and ministerial contexts. There were canons to the ordinary and archdeacons in our group, as well as parish priests, professors, and college chaplains. The underlying unity in the group was a firm belief that the Church's best days are still ahead of us and a commitment to leading the Church into this hopeful future.

We were housed for the week at Benjamin Franklin College, one of the newer undergraduate dorms and took most of our meals at Pauli Murray College, another undergraduate dorm named for the first Black woman to be ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church. Although the dorms were new, I was reminded very quickly that I am not 18 any longer. Several of us had to go to Target and buy pillows and mattress toppers. I might be younger than many, but I found out that I'm not young anymore!

The week consisted mostly of lectures and presentations from a very diverse group of esteemed faculty from the Divinity School, the Yale School of Medicine, the Institute for Sacred Music, the Yale University Art Gallery, and the Tsai Center for Innovative Thinking at Yale.

- Pauli Murray's Spirituality of Risk Taking with Dr. Donyelle McCray, Assistant Professor of Homiletics at YDS
- Spirituality of Adaptive Leadership with Dr. Brandon Nappi, Executive Director of Leadership Programs and Lecturer in Homiletics
- Finding Home in God with Dr. Miroslav Volf, Henry B. Wright Professor of Systematic Theology and Founding Director of the Yale Center for Faith and Culture
- Vulnerability and Innovation: A Pilgrimage Through the Heart of the Universe and The Ups and Downs of Creation of a New Community with the Rev'd Dr. Hillary Raining, Director of the Center for Christianity Spirituality and Affiliated Professor of Ascetic and Liturgical Theology at General Theological Seminary in New York

• Slow Looking with Dr. Felicity Harley-McGowan, taught at the Yale Art Gallery

- The Spiritual Practice of Fundraising with Kerry Robinson, Executive Partner, Leadership Roundtable and Executive Director of the Opus Prize Foundation
- Human Centered Design with Victor Padilla-Taylor and Abby Winslow, taught at the Tsai Center for Innovative Thinking and Yale
- Leading Faithful Innovation with ECMN's own the Rev'd Canon Dr Blair Pogue and the Rev'd Dr Dwight Zscheile
- Emotional Intelligence with Dr. Marc Brackett, Professor, Yale School of Medicine and Founding Director of the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence
- Leadership as an Act of Hope with the Rt Rev'd Dr Vincentia Kgabe, Bishop of Lesotho in South Africa

We were accompanied through all of this by the Very Rev'd Dr Robert Willis, KStJ, the Dean Emeritus of Canterbury and his partner Fletcher. Many may remember Fr Robert leading morning prayer from the garden of Canterbury Cathedral during the COVID-19 pandemic, kittens playfully drinking milk from a saucer at his feet. Dean Willis was an excellent spiritual guide and presided and preached at daily chapel services and the Holy Eucharist.

The cohort continues throughout the next eight months or so and culminates in a leadership project using techniques and skills gained from this program. Stay tuned for more information on that!

I'm very grateful for the opportunity to have attended this week in New Haven (thanks, in part, to funding from Bishop Loya and my continuing education budget here at All Saints.) It's no small thing to get a bunch of priests together in a room during the summer and an even more impressive thing to have every single one of us leaving with more hope for a brighter future.

As ever, please let me know if I can be praying for you in any particular way. I've been here seven months now and it feels like home! I'm grateful for each of you.

Pam Middleton and Elizabeth Campbell - Exterior Landscape/Garden Club

Whenever possible, we use Northfield/local contractors to support our community. Some of the work that we do requires us to use partners outside of Northfield. We are grateful to all the individuals and companies that keep our physical plant safe and up and running!

This summer I have either had inspections done or have them scheduled as follows:

<u>Fire Extinguisher Services</u> - A complete inspection took place the first week in June. Our kitchen fire extinguisher was replaced to meet new code requirements.

<u>Fire Alarm Notification Systems</u> - In early June, all our fire alarms were examined and met the expectations of Bruce Henning of Henning Fire Protection Equipment. Since we have a new priest and junior warden, we also updated the "call list" in case an emergency were to take place.

Fire Suppression (Sprinklers) - This check-up will take place in August.

<u>State of Minnesota Elevator Inspection</u> - This inspection was unannounced and completed in June. We found out we needed to repair/replace the elevator ceiling lights. A huge thank you to Dave Moening Electric (Northfield) who donated LED lights and his time to All Saints. Thank you, Dave for a job well done!

<u>Schindler Elevator</u> - Our annual inspection of the elevator will take place in July.

<u>A/C Annual Check</u> - Josh from Keith Pumper Plumbing and Heating checked all our air conditioning units on one of the many hot days we had in June. We are so grateful to Keith Pumper and Josh for the excellent attention to our A/C and furnace needs!

Episco-Speak A Guide to the Language of Episcopalians

You say you don't know your apse from your clerestory? Well, don't despair! Help is here. Each month I will attempt to dazzle you with my command of the vocabulary of Anglicans and Episcopalians. If there is some term or concept about which you want to learn more, I will also take requests. Please contact me!!

This month: The Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral (No, it's not a trick football play!)

The Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral is a four-point articulation of <u>Anglican</u> identity, often cited as encapsulating the fundamentals of the Communion's doctrine and as a reference-point for <u>ecumenical</u> discussion with other Christian denominations. The document is found on page 876 in your Book of Common Prayer. The four points are:

- 1. The <u>Holy Scriptures</u>, as containing all things necessary to salvation;
- 2. The Creeds (specifically, the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds), as the sufficient statement of Christian faith;
- 3. The Sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion;
- 4. The historic episcopate, locally adapted.

The Quadrilateral had its genesis in an 1870 essay by an American <u>Episcopal</u> priest, <u>William Reed Huntington</u>. Huntington's purpose in proposing these four elements was to establish "a basis on which approach may be by God's blessing, made toward Home Reunion," ie., with the <u>Roman Catholic</u> and <u>Orthodox</u> Churches.
